Madison has 43 miles of bike paths, 87 miles of bike lanes, and over 116 miles of bike routes total. Even Madison Metro buses are adorned with bike racks to stow bikes while using the bus.

There are many benefits to bicycling: improved overall health; it's an outdoor activity the entire family can enjoy together; and it's a simple, affordable, convenient mode of transportation. And let us not forget, riding a bike doesn't harm the environment! Pack up your bikes, your helmets, and a picnic and enjoy the afternoon on the trails that link up many of Madison's parks.

Madison's commitment to this healthy and active lifestyle is also encouraged through events like **Ride the Drive.** If you haven't hopped on a bike yet this year, **Sunday, June 5th** would be a great time to start. Thanks to a new program popping up in cities around the country called B-cycle, you don't have to own a bike to be able to enjoy its benefits. B-cycle is an urban bike sharing program that allows you to rent bikes. Trek Bicycle has graciously donated this new B-cycle system to the City of Madison, an initial investment of over 2 million dollars. The one year membership for the Madison B-cycle program costs a mere thirty cents a day. Or you can use your credit card to purchase a one day pass for 10 dollars, and that amount includes 10 dollars towards a membership. The bikes have adjustable seats for people of all sizes, as well as a basket for easy carrying. There are currently six active B-cycle rental racks spanning the downtown Madison area, and another 30 racks are supposed to be activated over the next two months including several parks such as, Olbrich Park, Tenney Park, Brittingham Park, and Vilas Park. Gates of Heaven - a Part of Madison's History

1863 – The Gates of Heaven synagogue was built by the Shaarei Shamayim (Gates of Heaven) congregation. The Gates of Heaven Synagogue was built in 1863 during the peak of the Civil War, which was named and used by this congregation for 16 years and became the first synagogue to exist in Madison. The quaint building was perfect for the congregation that never became greater than 20 Jewish families. Gates of Heaven was designed by August Kutzbach, an architect from Prussia. Kutzbach moved from Prussia to Madison in 1854 where he demonstrated his Romanesque Revival architectural style by designing Governor Farwell's Mansion (Soldier's Orphan Home), Madison's first City Hall, the 2nd State Capitol building.

1916 – The building was sold by the congregation. A variety of businesses bought or rented the building. It has been used as a funeral parlor, tea room, beauty shop, office for congressional campaigns, government storage facility, headquarters of the Women's Christian Temperance Union, the First Church of Christ Scientist, the English Lutheran Church, and as a location for many professional and business ventures including dental and veterinarian services.

July 17, 1971 – Originally located on 214 West Washington Ave., the building was left standing alone on an empty city block waiting for its fate of demolition just like its neighbors in order for the block to be replaced with a modern ten story bank. Due to its 1970 acceptance to the National Register of Historic Places and the efforts of Madison's devoted citizens, specifically Norton and Lois Stoler, who raised \$20,000 to preserve the building through their grassroots efforts, the synagogue was purchased by the city in 1971 and moved eight blocks to its current location on the shores of Lake Mendota in James Madison Park on July 17, 1971.

Today the building is currently a popular wedding site, used for concerts and memorable locations, and is a beautiful historic landmark. This year marks the 40th anniversary of the 148 year old synagogue in its new location. The rentable building, owned by the City of Madison, is preserved through continuing landscaping and beautification projects through the Gates of Heaven Preservation Fund.


