# City of Madison FY19 Annual Action Plan: Substantial Amendment #2 to Accept Additional 2020 CARES Act Funding

In March 2020, Congress passed and the President signed the *Coronavirus Aid, Relief and Economic Security Act* ("CARES Act"), which provides critical supplemental funding to communities in their local response efforts to the COVID-19 pandemic.

Acceptance of the CARES Act funds that are allocated via HUD's Office of Community Planning and Development (CPD) requires a HUD Grantee to submit a Substantial Amendment to its FY19 Annual Action Plan. The City of Madison submitted an initial Substantial Amendment to its FY19 AAP to accept CARES Act funds in August 2020, which was subsequently approved by HUD.

On September 11, 2020, HUD awarded the City of Madison an increased allocation of CDBG-CV funds through the CARES Act. Acceptance of these additional funds requires the City to submit another Substantial Amendment to its FY19 Annual Action Plan.

Changes from the City of Madison's initial Substantial Amendment to its FY19 AAP are highlighted on the pages that follow.
