
Observers

Anyone, other than a candidate on the ballot, may be an observer at the polls during voting hours.



Observer Area

- ★ 6 to 8 feet from activity being observed
- ★ Painter's tape used to mark boundaries at 6 a.m.



Observation Hours

★ From 7 a.m. until election officials finish closing the polls


★ Present photo ID

Observer Receives

- ★ Name tag to be worn inside polling place at all times
- ★ Observer Rules-at-a-Glance brochure



Rules of Conduct

- ★ May only address Chief or designee
- ★ May not interact with voters, except when requested by voter
- ★ Must stay in designated area



Limited Space

★ Chief may limit the number of observers representing one organization/candidate if there isn't enough room for everyone to socially distance



Acoustics

★ If you cannot hear names and addresses announced at poll book, tell Chief Inspector



Voter Privacy

- May not see how someone is marking their ballot
- ★ No hovering by voting booths or tabulator may observe <u>public</u> <u>aspects</u> of voting process




Curbside Voters

★ May not enter voter's vehicle



No Cell Phone Conversations

- ★ Text messages are OK
- ★ Other silent usage of cell phone is OK



Photography or Video

- May not photograph/videotape voters or poll workers while polls are open for voting
- ★ May take pictures after polls close, if not disruptive

May Not View Documents with Personally Identifiable Information

- ★ Voter registration application forms
- ★ Proof of address
- ★ Voter ID
- ★ Ineligible List
- ★ Observer Log



Observing the Process

- ★ Offers to help will be declined
- ★ May only observe



Questions or Issues

- **★** Talk to Chief Inspector first
- ★ No yelling in the polling place
- ★ False reports to Clerk's Office affect credibility



No Political Discussions



- ★ No conversations about candidates, political parties, or referenda
- ★ No clothing or buttons related to candidates, political parties or referenda

Disruptions

- Disruptions are always prohibited
- ★ Whether something is disruptive is at the discretion of the Chief Inspector



No Frivolous Challenges

- ★ Way voter looks
- ★ Language voter speaks
- ★ Home in foreclosure
- ★ Vehicle in which voter arrives at the polls




One Warning from Chief


- ★ Disruptive
- ★ Threaten orderly conduct of election
- ★ Interfere with voting process
- ★ Fail to follow observer rules



Observers Ordered to Leave



- ★ Order to Leave Polling Place form
- ★ May not observe at any other polling location on Election Day




Elected Officials

Elected officials are not exempt from observer rules

Media

- ★ Check in with Chief
- ★ May take photos or video
 - May not be disruptive
 - Need permission of those they are filming or photographing
 - May not show how someone voted



Closing the Polls

- ★ Open meeting
- Anyone, including candidates, may observe
- ★ Observers may take photos or video if not disruptive
- May request a copy of results tape
