 - iii. Only wood fiber mulch and shredded rubber mulch meet those requirements
- Project Location & Site Constraints
 - a. Adjacent Playgrounds
 - i. There are 8 existing playgrounds within 1 mile of Kennedy Park (2 were replaced in the last 5 years (Hiestand (2019) and Galaxy (2020); and one will be replaced this year as well (Portland Park (2025).

b. Site Conditions

- i. The existing playground location can generally be reused –sits in a good location relative to other amenities in the park such as the picnic shelter and will retain existing asphalt path connection to the park's main walking path access
- ii. 2-3 new backed benches will be added adjacent to and/or within the new playground footprint; both of the existing benches that are semi- associated with the current playground are not in good shape (and generally sit very low) – they will be removed as part of the project.
- iii. Existing equipment and mixed pea gravel/rubber surfacing will be fully removed with project Parks staff makes every effort to reuse and recycle as many components as possible.

Project Timetable

a. Construction in 2025 – Parks seeks to minimize "down time" from when existing equipment is removed to the new equipment going in. If the neighborhood is aware of "blackout" dates for planned events/festivals in 2025, please let Kate know – the contract can be scheduled around the event to ensure the playground is still in-place.

Project Budget

- a. Approximately \$72,000 for the playground equipment.
- b. (NOTE: Kennedy Park is a "Community" level park in the City of Madison and as such in 2025 Parks will be installing <u>BOTH</u> a 2-5 age range structure and a 5-12 age range structure)

• Kennedy Park Equipment and Play Surfacing Selection

- a. Age Group: attendees reached consensus for intended age range choosing a as noted above, Kennedy Park will receive both a 2-5 age range structure and a 5-12 age range structure in 2025.
- b. Surfacing: The attendees discussed the pros/cons of both wood fiber and rubber mulch surfacing along with the preferred but exceeding budget contiguous surfaces used at the inclusive playgrounds in Madison (ex. Poured-in-place rubber) but landed through majority vote for wood surfacing.
- c. Playlines: After discussion & review attendees selected the playground manufacturer Gametime for the 5-12 structure and Burke for the 2-5 structure and requested the next designs to show playground structures that have a roofed elements (both age ranges) and hanging seats/roped steppers and climbing features such as those shown on the middle image of the 5-12 Gametime visual; as well as a storefront panel/shop window, teeter totter element and driver's wheel on the 2-5 structure.
- d. Colors: attendees liked the idea of returning a "purple" playground to Kennedy – as that is how it is generally known by the neighborhood. The options to add "lime/limon" and "sky/light blue" handrails to accompany the purple posts was appealing and would allow attendees at the next session to choose from equipment designs with these color options for the next meeting.
- e. Fundraising was discussed primarily around the request to utilize contiguous surfacing (such as poured-in-place rubber) but given the approximately 3x cost increase it was seen as exceeding the capabilities within the neighborhood.

Next Steps
