

In 2010, the Madison Police Department moved from reporting crime data using the traditional Summary Based Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) to Incident Based Reporting (IBR). IBR and UCR are reporting systems used by law enforcement agencies in the United States for collecting and reporting crime data to the Federal Bureau of Investigation. The general concepts, such as jurisdictional rules, of collecting and reporting UCR data are the same as in IBR. However, IBR goes into much greater detail than the summary-based UCR system and IBR reports all offenses involved in a particular incident.

The Federal Bureau of Investigation is encouraging all law enforcement agencies to move to the IBR method. However, not all law enforcement agencies are certified to submit IBR, therefore they continue to report UCR. For example, there are 529 law enforcement agencies in Wisconsin and approximately 107 are certified in IBR reporting. This makes it very difficult to compare crime nationally.

In the first quarter 2017, Madison Police Department responded to 32,071 calls for service resulting in 5,474 IBR offenses.

In the second quarter 2017, Madison Police Department responded to 36,206 calls for service resulting in 6,214 IBR offenses.

In the third quarter 2017, Madison Police Department responded to 38,772 calls for service resulting in 6,708 IBR offenses.

In the fourth quarter 2017, Madison Police Department responded to 37,537 calls for service resulting in 5,794 IBR offenses.
