



LARGE ITEM FEE CHANGES FOR 2024

If your home pays the Resource Recovery Special Charge, you will not be charged additional fees for certain large items when you make the required large item work orders for curbside collection or when these certain large items are delivered to a drop-off site.

If you do not pay the Resource Recovery Special Charge, then you will still need to pay the necessary fee for these certain items when making your required work orders for curbside pickup. Any necessary fee would also need to be paid prior to bringing these certain items to a drop-off site.

Who pays the Resource Recovery Special Charge?

If your recycling is collected by the City of Madison Streets Division, then you pay the Resource Recovery Special Charge. The charge appears on the Madison Municipal Services Bill. This is the same monthly bill that includes the charges for your water usage.

What are "Large Items"?

Items too large for the trash cart, or items requiring special handling such as appliances, furniture, tires, exercise equipment, and many other bulky items.

Large item work orders are required to have your items picked up at the curb. Create your work order online. Call the Streets Division offices for assistance with the form. If you set large items out for collection without a work order, you may be fined by Building Inspection.

Set the item out on the date you selected in the work order. Do not set the item out early. Items are collected during the work week following the set out Sunday.

Defining "Large Item"

Large items are big things too large for the trash cart, items requiring a fee, or items that require special handling. This includes appliances, microwaves, furniture, tires, exercise equipment, toilets, pianos, and many other bulky items.

Large items **are not** oversized cardboard boxes, or excess bags of trash from a household cleanup.

Large Item Placement Guidelines

- » Stack items neatly in the right of way / terrace along public streets.
- » Keep metal items/appliances and non-metal items separated.
- » Keep items four feet from obstructions like utility poles, street signs, etc.
- » Avoid setting items underneath low-hanging wires or branches.
- » All large items must be less than 8 feet in length.

YARD WASTE COLLECTION


Manage your yard waste (and some food waste) at home and benefit your garden, too. Home composting guides are available at your Madison Public Library branch.



ELECTRONICS RECYCLING

Many electronics are required to be recycled at drop-off sites. The items include televisions, printers, and even VCRs and video game systems. More details about electronics recycling can be found on the website.



BATTERY RECYCLING

Lithium batteries can be a fire hazard. Do not place them into your recycling cart.

Follow the directions on the website to bring in your lithium batteries, and other batteries, for recycling.

DROP-OFF SITES

Before loading your vehicle, check the hours and locations of the sites and what they accept.

Drop-off site hours change seasonally. They may also close due to severe weather.



BRUSH COLLECTION

Brush is the branches, limbs, sticks, and other woody material you have cut from your trees, shrubs, and bushes. The pieces must be at least 18 inches in length.

Collection opportunities occur throughout the year. Material is also accepted at the drop-off sites.

RECYCLING

- » Keep the recycling cart lid closed when out for collection.
- » Recyclables inside the cart must be clean, empty, and dry.
- » Do not bag your recyclables, except for shredded paper.
 - If you must use a bag, only clear bags are acceptable.

NEVER place the following items into the recycling cart:

» Batteries

- » Light bulbs
- » Styrofoam

» Clothing


- » Plastic bags & film
- » Trash

- » Electronics
- » Ropes, hoses, etc.
- » Wood
